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

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# Equestrian Science Mission Statement

William Woods students will have the unique opportunity to be involved in the management of a facility that houses 157 horses. Many educational opportunities will arise during your years at WWU.

Posting sensitive information regarding William Woods owned horses should be left to the Equestrian Faculty.

All veterinary care is considered confidential just as it is at any other equine facility.

When a William Woods horse is lost due to illness or injury it is important that the information is **ONLY** posted by a WWU Faculty member.

This procedure ensures donors are contacted prior to any posting.

William Woods equestrian faculty are sensitive to student concerns regarding every horse's health and welfare.

Sensitive information includes but is not limited to:

When a William Woods horse is put down due to illness or injury.

When a William Woods horse has a lameness or injury.

On-going medical or therapeutic treatment of William Woods horses under certain circumstances.

# 6 ways to improve your Advising Experience

**NOTE:** You will sign up for the Applied Riding, Long Lining and Driving and Horse Management Classes in the EQS Complex. You will receive an email with the details.



In order for the whole Advising process to go smoothly follow these easy steps

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Look on Owlnet for the complete class schedule



Create a reasonable schedule for yourself remembering your credit status (freshman/sophomore/junior/senior)



Look up your advisor and make an appointment during the appropriate advising weeks offered for your credit status



Show up on time for your advising appointment bringing your pre-made schedule with you



Your advisor will enter your schedule into Filebound and give you a copy which will take the "advising hold" off of your account and allow you to register



Register for your classes on Owlnet at the appropriate time for your credit status

# RIDING INFORMATION



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No student is allowed to ride or handle a horse without a signed WWU liability release form



## When Can I Ride?

There should always be a faculty member or Graduate Assistant in the barn if you plan on riding. The arena supervision chart and available riding times will be posted on a white board in the UPHA Arena



## What Should I Wear?

Anytime that you are in the EQS Complex to handle or ride a horse you should be dressed appropriately according to the guidelines provided by your seat instructor.



## What Horse Can I Ride?

It is normal for you to be able to "Free Ride" any horse that you have successfully ridden in one of your applied riding classes unless specified by your instructor.



## Lungeing-LongLining Driving

The UPHA Arena belongs to the Long Lining and Driving class on Fridays from 9-11 am and 1-3 pm. There is no "Free Riding" in there at those times.

## Where Can I Ride?

You may ride in the UPHA Arena and in the outdoor arena with permission from your riding instructor. You CANNOT ride in the Rowland Arena without at least ONE other student with you for safety reasons.



# PROFICIENCY TEST

## EVERYTHING YOU WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT PROFICIENCIES BUT WERE AFRAID TO ASK

You will be able to take this test when you have sophomore level credit status.

You have the ability to choose the horse you wish to test on.

Dressage riders will test at horse shows until they get the appropriate scores they need to pass.

You should take Theory of Performance Horse Management and Intro to the Horse Industry before you take this test.

If you ride Saddle Seat you will do a pattern and rail work on a 3-Gaited horse and rail work on a 5-Gaited horse.

Hunter/Jumper riders will have to perform a course on both a Hunter and a Jumper.

You will be able to take the riding portion of this test until you pass it.

If you ride Western you will be asked to perform on both a "stock type" and a "show type" horse. You will also perform a pattern with one.

This test is three parts.  
Written Test  
Formal Turnout/Interview  
Riding Test.

If you fail to pass the written portion of the test you must not only re-take it but also the interview.

This test is **REQUIRED** for all EQS Majors.

Every horse on campus will have a Horse Management student or "Keeper" in charge of them for the semester.

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Keeper names and phone numbers are on the feed card located on each horse's stall.

Dressage, Hunter/Jumper and Western Keepers turn their horses out daily.

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Keepers will care for and maintain all blankets and sheets that belong to the horses in their strings.



EQS and EQA Majors are required to take both Horse Management I and Horse Management II.

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Keepers should be notified if there is an issue with a horse or any of it's equipment.

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Keepers will maintain their horse's mane, tail and clipping to ensure they are prepared for riding class

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Keepers will demonstrate skills in Clipping, Manual Restraints, Horse Health Check, Sheath Cleaning and Bandaging.

# HORSE MANAGEMENT II

# STALL CLEANING TIPS

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Tips for keeping your horse's stall dry and comfortable



## NEWS FLASH!

Keeping your horse's stall clean and dry can prevent him from developing THRUSH which can make him sore and lame.

Do not leave wheel barrels filled with manure around the barn

Take out the WET SPOT

Pick out the MANURE

Dig down to the mats

Pull older shavings down to cover cleaned area

Put in clean shavings

Take manure out to pad and dump leaving empty wheel barrels for others

## I Should Tell My Seat Instructor or a Faculty Member If...

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- ☺ A rider falls off.
- ☺ My horse is not eating any/all of his hay.
- ☺ You see a horse with an injury that needs attention.
- ☺ A horse is displaying dangerous behavior while handling.
- ☺ There is a riding/turnout conflict that needs to be resolved.
- ☺ You have your own saddle that you are interested in using for class or free riding.

All of the string managers are here to help you...if they do not know something is wrong they cannot help.

# Horse and Rider Emergencies

Do NOT move the person unless they are in harm's way

Have someone else catch the horse while you attend to the injured person first

Call faculty of staff for help

If the person is having breathing problems or has a life threatening injury IMMEDIATELY call 911

If the EMT has been called please assist with directional control and getting them to the injured person as quickly as possible



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## Missouri Equine Liability Statute

WARNING: Under Missouri law, an equine professional is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in equine activities resulting from the inherent risks of equine activities pursuant to the Revised Statutes of Missouri.



# APPLIED RIDING POLICIES

Inform your riding instructor at the beginning of the semester if you have any medical problems. Your safety is always the #1 priority.

Your riding instructor will inform you if there will be no riding in the case of severe weather such as a thunderstorm, tornado, snow storm or ice.

Always consult the class syllabus for policies regarding absences, grading, coursework and horse showing.

If you are an EQS Major you will have to ride 3 of the 4 disciplines.

Always dress in the appropriate attire required by your seat instructor any time you are in the barn to handle or ride a horse. Strive to maintain a professional appearance.

Enrollment in to Applied Riding classes occurs before regular class registration so you can plan the rest of your schedule accordingly. You will receive an email with the sign-up time.

Each weekend you will be able to "Free Ride" horses that you have successfully ridden in class. The "Free Ride" lists will be outside of your seat instructor's office. The available arena time will be on the white board in the UPHA Arena.

You will need to make sure that there is a supervisor in the EQS Complex any time you are going to ride outside of your scheduled riding class time.

You will need to make sure you have a riding buddy either ride with you or supervise if you want to ride in RARA. You are not allowed to ride alone in RARA.





# PROPER CARE OF THE WWU SCHOOL HORSE



It is good to have at least 1 hour available BEFORE and AFTER you ride in order for you to properly care for your horse.

If the temperature outside is below 55 degrees you should bring a cooler with you to class to avoid letting your horse catch a chill after your ride.

If it is a hot day your horse may need a sponge bath. Make sure to completely scrape the water off immediately.

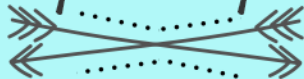
Being in an Applied Riding class requires that you carry out the following duties:

- ✓ GROOMING
- ✓ PICK OUT HOOVES (BEFORE AND AFTER CLASS)
- ✓ TACK/UN-TACK THE HORSE BY YOURSELF
- ✓ COMPLETELY COOLING OUT THE HORSE AFTER CLASS
- ✓ DUMPING AND SCRUBBING WATER BUCKETS
- ✓ BRUSH OFF AND REAPPLY ANY BLANKETS THE HORSE WEARS
- ✓ CLEANING AND PUTTING AWAY ALL TACK USED

When you are finished with your ride your horse should have no sweat marks and be cleaner then when you started!!

HORSE SHOWING IS A GOOD WAY TO NETWORK WITH POTENTIAL EMPLOYERS
